




LOCATION



Bedford County consists of 764 square miles located in west-central Virginia just east of the Roanoke metropolitan area. The city of Bedford is situated on the U.S. Route 460 corridor midway between Roanoke to the west and Lynchburg and Campbell County to the east. The scenic Blue Ridge Mountains make up the county's western border. The James River forms the northeast boundary. The 23,400-acre Smith Mountain Lake is situated to the south. The community is home to a diversified industrial base and displays an appealing quality of life.

The city of Bedford is 115 miles west of Richmond, the state capital; 210 miles southwest of Washington, D.C.; and 215 miles west of Norfolk. Lynchburg is about 24 miles east and Roanoke is 29 miles west.

Bedford County and the city of Bedford are part of the Lynchburg Metropolitan Statistical Area (MSA).



Employment by Sector* (2nd Qtr. 2006)



GOVERNMENT

Bedford County has a County Administrator and a seven-member Board of Supervisors. Bedford City has a City Manager and a seven-member City Council.

Bedford City and Bedford County have comprehensive plans and zoning and subdivision ordinances.

Bedford is the county seat. There are no incorporated towns within the county.

TAXES

Localities in Virginia collect a 1% sales tax. They do not tax other items taxed at the State level.

Counties and cities in Virginia are separate taxing entities. Therefore, a company pays taxes to either

a county or to a city.

If a company is located in a town, it pays town and county taxes except for utility taxes which are paid only to the town and the license tax which is paid only to the town unless town law permits the additional collection of a county tax.

Manufacturers pay real estate, machinery and tools, truck and automobile, utility, and sales taxes.

Nonmanufacturers pay real estate, tangible personal property, truck and automobile, utility, and sales taxes. They also may pay either a merchants' capital or a license tax.

COMMUNITY FACILITIES

Convenient medical care is available at Bedford Memorial Hospital located in the city of Bedford. This facility provides 178 patient beds of which 111 beds are for long-term care. In addition, both neighboring Lynchburg and Roanoke have five major hospitals to serve the vast majority of health care requirements of the region. The Bedford County Health Department also provides public health services to the community. Emergency transport is provided by rescue squad ambulances and the Life Guard 10 medical helicopter.

Twenty-four physicians practice in the Bedford area representing eight specialties. Thirteen dentists have local practices in either the city or the county.

Nine retirement and nursing homes provide intermediate and extended care for 302 residents. The Carriage Hill Retirement Center offers 64 rooms for independent retirement living. In addition, the Elks National Home is located in the city of Bedford.

About 123 Protestant churches of many denominations are found in the Bedford area. Two Catholic churches are located in the community. Greek Orthodox churches and Jewish synagogues are located in nearby Lynchburg and Roanoke.

The Bedford Public Library, with a collection of more than 150,000 volumes, is based in the city of Bedford and maintains five branch operations. The library offers special homebound service to persons confined to their homes.



Shopping needs of residents can be easily met through five shopping centers in the county and in Bedford's revitalized Centertown--its central business district. In addition, the close proximity of both Roanoke and Lynchburg to Bedford provides residents a vast array of retail options ranging from regional malls to neighborhood shopping centers and specialty shops.

LIFESTYLE

The Bedford area offers a complete leisure services package for residents of all ages. Both the county and city operate comprehensive recreation programs including organized athletics, special events, and excursions outside the community for outlet shopping and dramatic theater and to visit tourist attractions such as Colonial Williamsburg. Local school facilities are used for holding many athletic programs. Liberty Lake Park is the centerpiece for recreational activity in Bedford. This 59-acre park includes a lighted multi-purpose ball field, baseball field, softball field, tennis courts, children's playgrounds, picnic shelters, and an outdoor racquetball court, the first of its kind in Virginia.

Roughly 20 acres of the park are being reserved for future passive recreation development. Bedford has an expanding YMCA program with an indoor junior Olympic-size swimming pool, weight room, and gymnasium. Golfers will find one public and three private golf courses in the community.

The county's location adjacent to the Blue Ridge Mountains puts the community in close contact with the Blue Ridge Parkway. One of America's most scenic roads, the Parkway offers numerous overlooks, campgrounds, picnic areas, and hiking trails. Just ten miles northwest of Bedford City are the Peaks of Otter with lodging facilities offering travelers and visitors delicious food and fine accommodations in a beautiful, rustic setting. To the south, the 23,400-acre Smith Mountain Lake provides numerous opportunities to enjoy water sports of all types. Numerous recreational developments and several resorts can be found along the lake's 500 miles of shoreland. A 1,200-acre state park provides camping and swimming amenities along the shore.

Sport fishermen will enjoy the smallmouth bass in the James River, which forms the county's northern boundary. Also, miles of stocked mountain trout streams are available including many in the Jefferson National Forest in western Bedford County.

The Little Town Players perform live theatre in Bedford at the Elks National Home Theatre. This successful community theatre group is beginning its third decade of producing popular drama for residents of Central Virginia. The nearby Roanoke and Lynchburg metropolitan areas add to the cultural enrichment of Bedford residents.

Roanoke's Center in the Square houses science and history museums, a planetarium, a playhouse, and a fine arts center. The Lynchburg Fine Arts Center hosts two art galleries, a theater, and two dance studios and is the site of a full calendar of cultural events. Eight colleges in the region also help contribute to a high level of cultural sophistication.

In the midst of Bedford Centertown, the Bedford City/County Museum provides two floors of exhibits from Bedford's heritage including Indian artifacts, Revolutionary and Civil War memorabilia, examples of native wildlife, and a library of historical and genealogical information.

Bedford is the site for the National D-Day Memorial, and was chosen because of its distinction as the community that sustained the highest per capita loss of lives during the invasion.
