


Ag Board program components include:

- ◆ Marketing
 - Provide leadership and coordination for new and existing markets for ag commodities
 - Seek grant opportunities to assist agriculture
 - Develop an agriculture directory
 - Assist with growth and vitality of area farmers markets
 - Develop a “Bedford Grown” branded farm product program
- ◆ Land Preservation
 - Promote and assist in developing land preservation programs such as Ag and Forestal Districts, Conservation Districts and Land Use Assessment Taxation.
- ◆ Education
 - Coordinate with the public school system to increase awareness and promote agricultural programs
 - Develop informational brochures that educate the non-farm public
- ◆ Other Related Work
 - Cooperative support of related initiatives and county departments
 - Assistance with lobbying efforts that affect agricultural vitality
 - Dedicated website space for agriculture related matters such as land exchange/rent opportunities, farm product guide, ag statistics, and more

Bedford County Agriculture

Agriculture has long been the backbone of Bedford County's economy. From the mid 18th century when everything was done by hand to the 21st century with the newest techniques, farming is “alive and well” in Bedford County. Although new residents may take a little while to adjust to tractors or other farm vehicles on 2 lane roads, they will certainly enjoy locally raised fresh foods, along with the beautiful views and open spaces.



The US Census of Agriculture, 2007, reports that farm sales in Bedford County totaled over \$23.6 million that year and accounted for 2,889 jobs. The total economic impact, which also includes forestry and considers a secondary multiplier effect, totaled \$135.7 million. As anyone can see, agriculture and forestry are vitally important.

CATTLE

Due to the abundance of hay and pasture land, Bedford County supports a large number of beef cattle farms as



well as several dairy farms and heifer breeding operations. Bedford County ranks # 3 in Virginia for hay production and # 4 for all cattle and calves.

HORSES

Equestrian interests run high throughout the county, as evidenced by the newly formed Bedford Equine Association that meets monthly to discuss issues of particular interest. Bedford County ranks # 4 in Virginia for the number of horses.



WINERIES & VINEYARDS



One significant new development in recent years is the emergence of wineries throughout the

FARMERS OF THE FUTURE



Bedford County is highly invested in its young farmers. In addition to 4-H and Future Farmers of America (FFA) organizations in area high schools, there is a Young Farmers organization under the guidance of the local Farm Bureau and area chapters in the local high schools.

One activity that Bedford County can take real pride in is the creation of an agricultural curriculum in the Virginia Community College system. The program, funded mostly by the Virginia Tobacco Commission, originated in Bedford County but is due to be taught in three community colleges in the fall of 2009, with expectations of as many as eight colleges over the next few years. LAND PRESERVATION & CONSERVATION

The Virginia Outdoors Foundation reports that over 6,400 acres have been protected in perpetuity as farmland and open space in Bedford County. In addition to several working farms protected by conservation easements, Lynchburg College's Claytor Nature Study Center is a 470 acre classroom and laboratory in north Bedford County dedicated to the study and appreciation of our natural environment.
